William Carroll "Billy" Pritchard dedicated his professional life to the Elizabeth City Fire Department, where he served honorably as the Fire Chief for many years. In his personal life, "Billy" was a devoted member of an Elizabeth City church and a passionate figure at a local racetrack, working in the pits and on cars, or cooking in the concession stand. When he died February 18, 2025, at the age of 71, Twiford Funeral Homes, L.L.C. was honored to provide his family and the residents of Northeastern, North Carolina with a service of remembrance. Several meetings with Fire Department personnel were required: to co-ordinate their presence at the service with their firetrucks, for them to practice folding the flag and the presentation speech, and to practice their pallbearer duties. It was also necessary to determine when and where the firetrucks were going to be set up in the parking lot of the funeral home for the visitation, and at the church for the service as well. For the flags hanging from the ladder trucks to display properly without blocking anything important was an interesting exercise in adjusting angles.

The three ministers who led the service accommodated each other, the guests and family, and the funeral home staff in their plans for the service. Specific speakers were asked to participate and to keep their remarks brief as a courtesy, as nobody in the family thought opening the floor was a good idea! The family selected specific songs to be played during the service which were special to "Billy" and musicians were asked to play. Arranging the number of flowers which were present, both at the funeral home for the visitation, and at the church for the service itself, took the strategic planning of a military campaign.
