1) Rationale behind the idea:

Members of the YAC volunteered during the open house with photos and a special thank you on pages 28 and 29 post-event Facebook comments too.

Our community loves to tour the Hannah House and experience the peaceful, sanctuary like setting of this magnificent "gift" from Perry Hannah to our community. We even had our gardens setup as we do for funeral or memorial services held in this very unique and beautiful location. This "gift" of our 125th anniversary celebration was for residents and visitors to our community. However, residents will hopefully think of our funeral home when "God calls" as they are both familiar with our sanctuary-like setting and the comforting, peaceful ambiance one feels the moment you step through the front doors of our historic building.

2) Detailed description of the activity:

Peg created a press release about the event, Facebook and TC Ticker ads too. (Please see page 30 and consequent great press on page 31) Peg and Les were on the popular Ron Jolly radio program to help promote the event. (See page 32) Peg organized 45 docents, arranged for

their boutonniere's, pre-event lunch, created history cards for their room(s) and sent thank you notes to all with a gift certificate for dinner at Minerva's located in one of Perry Hannah's former architectural gifts - the Park Place Hotel. (See page 33)

She contacted all other participants i.e. Father Fred Food Pantry's Paula Prusick who collected can goods in the parlor with both Father Fred and Perry Hannah life-size cutouts.

Peg purchased 125th anniversary wooden yardstick as both a remembrance and funeral home advertising. Kyle, Jillian and Deb also helped with various materials for this event.

3) Benefits provided to families or the community at large:

Our community lined the sidewalk to have the opportunity to enjoy the 125th anniversary of the Perry Hannah Home and experience the home and garden's magnificent beauty with all five senses.

Participants were encouraged to bring non-perishable food panty "gift(s)" to benefit the Father Fred Food panty. Thus they were able to feel good about bringing a gift to be gifted and help feed the hungry in our community.

All 3,100+ guests enjoyed all four floors of the Hannah House and gardens too learning so much from the 45 docents strategically positioned throughout the building. The gardens caretakers, Bart and Gail Ingraham and Kevin Juett were on hand as well to answer all questions.

Our community learned how each room was used Then (when Perry Hannah lived here) and Now including special exhibits like authors in Perry's former library such as Paul Welch (A Colorful Cast - history of NMC's Art Department) and Val Winans was even in our lounge with her dog Remington and his book entitled "Road Trip with Remington Beagle: Michigan to Alaska and Back.

Everyone enjoyed beautiful floral arrangements created by both local florists and members of The

Friendly Garden Club of Traverse City in both home and garden locations. Example thank you notes appear on pages 34, 35 and 36.

4) Benefits provided to funeral home and staff:

Every staff member was invited and encouraged to participate in the many activities ranging from the July 3, 2018 National Cherry Festival Heritage Parade to the exciting 125th anniversary open house day on September 9, 2018.

Members of our Reynolds-Jonkhoff work family and friends walked in the National Cherry Festival's Heritage Parade on July 3. Professional photographer, Don Rutt took photos with his wife Pat during the event to be included in the eventual third printing of *Perry Hannah's Gifts Then and Now*.
